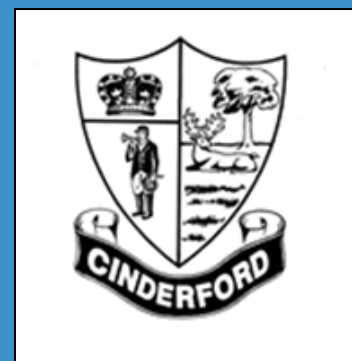

CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE

Like many towns across the country, Cinderford continues to face the challenges of changing shopping habits and the decline of traditional high streets. Regenerating and repurposing the town centre remains one of the Town Council's key priorities, and while this is a significant undertaking, progress continues to be made.

Over recent years, the Town Council has invested in a number of important community buildings, including the former HSBC Bank in Market Street, Rheola House, the former Dockham Road Health Centre and The Wesley Church. These buildings have been given new purposes, ensuring they continue to serve the community for many years to come.

It is pleasing to see that the new seating installed in The Triangle has also been well received and is being enjoyed by residents and visitors alike.



The Council continues to work closely with partners, including the District and County Councils, to encourage investment and redevelopment across the town. It is particularly encouraging to see parts of the former Engelhard site being brought back into use, demonstrating confidence in Cinderford's future.

Cinderford continues to receive positive recognition on the national stage thanks to our Town Crier, Jer Holland, whose success in competitions across the country helps raise the profile of our town.

Supporting local businesses remains an important priority. While many aspects of economic development sit beyond the Town Council's powers, we will continue to work with partners, promote local businesses and look for opportunities to strengthen our town centre. The Town Centre is home to a fabulous cinema, butchers, cake shop and independent coffee amongst many others – please support your local traders and businesses whenever possible.

The Town Council also takes pride in maintaining attractive public spaces. Our seasonal floral displays continue to brighten the town throughout the year, and preparations are already well underway for this year's Christmas lights, helping to create a welcoming atmosphere for residents, businesses and visitors during the festive season.

PARTNERSHIP WORKING DELIVERS NEW PITCH-SIDE FENCING AT STEAM MILLS RECREATION GROUND

Representatives from Cinderford Town Council, Cinderford Town Youth Football Club, Rank Outsiders Football Club, and Matthew Bishop MP recently visited Steam Mills Recreation Ground to view the newly installed pitch-side fencing, funded through the Enover Community Trust. The new fencing has been installed to protect the playing surface from damage caused by wild boar, helping to preserve the quality of the pitch and ensuring it remains a safe, secure, and accessible facility for local football teams, school pupils, and the wider community throughout the year.

This project demonstrates the value of partnership working, bringing together the Town Council, local grassroots sports clubs and funding partners; to protect and enhance an important community asset. By safeguarding the playing field, the project will help ensure that future generations can continue to enjoy high-quality sporting facilities in Cinderford.

Cinderford Town Council would like to extend its sincere thanks to the Enover Community Trust for supporting the project through the Landfill Communities Fund. Their generous contribution has delivered lasting benefits for players, volunteers, spectators and the wider community, ensuring Steam Mills Recreation Ground remains a well-maintained and valued local facility for years to come.



COMMITTEE MEETINGS UPDATE

Cinderford Town Council committees have been busy progressing a range of projects and initiatives across the town.

Estates & Finance Committee

The committee reviewed property maintenance and improvement works across council-owned buildings, including Dockham Road, St Annals House, Rheola House and The Wesley. Approval was given for repairs to address water ingress issues and for CCTV installation at The Wesley. The committee also agreed to proceed with the 2026 Christmas lights programme and to undertake a trial of solar-powered festive lighting.

Financial reports and the annual audit were received, with the Internal Auditor providing a clean opinion on the Council's accounts.

Cinderford Town Council also awarded a wide range of community grants which were awarded to local organisations to support youth activities, community projects, sport, arts, churchyard maintenance, sensory services and family support programmes.

Playing Fields Committee

The committee received the latest playground safety inspection reports and noted that regular play area checks continue to identify no major concerns. Updates were also received on the new pull-up and dip bars installed at Miners Welfare Playing Field, funded through a Gloucestershire County Council grant application. More information on the equipment is provided in this newsletter.

The committee also reviewed allotment, skatepark and tree management matters, with ongoing work continuing across council recreational spaces.

Events Committee

Planning is well underway for a busy programme of community events. The committee reviewed recent events including recent Festivals, VE Day commemorations, the Continental Market and youth engagement activities.

Preparations are progressing for Cindyfest 2026, taking place on 30 August 2026, with discussions covering road closures, stalls, entertainment, security, first aid and event management arrangements.

The committee also approved a new Buskers & Street Entertainment Voluntary Code and agreed to establish a Cinderford Buskers Network to support local performers. Planning continues for Heritage Open Day, Christmas celebrations and a range of youth and community activities.

The Council remains committed to investing in local facilities, supporting community organisations and delivering events that bring residents together. If you have an idea for a Cinderford event please get in touch with your local Councillor.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING UPDATE - JULY 2026

Cinderford Town Council met on 14 July to discuss a wide range of local issues, projects and community initiatives. Councillors welcomed updates from Gloucestershire Police, with discussions focusing on parking concerns and anti-social behaviour across the town. The Council also heard from Forest of Dean District Council's Arts, Culture and Heritage Officer about plans to develop a new strategy and action plan for the district, with members highlighting the importance of The Wesley as a key community arts venue.

Councillors noted the successful completion of the Levelling Up/Local Regeneration Fund improvement works to several town centre buildings and thanked staff for their work in delivering the projects. Updates were provided on other council owned properties.

Members also approved plans for a youth football pitch at Miners Welfare Playing Field, received an update on efforts to secure the future of the Forest Climbing Centre, and agreed to identify options to help protect and preserve The Wesley for future generations.

Further community projects progressed during the meeting, including the installation of a new town centre noticeboard, heritage trail slabs, emergency planning updates and support for the recruitment of a new Forest of Dean Market Towns Officer.

The Council approved a grant award to CANDI and reviewed the latest financial reports, insurance arrangements and council expenditure. Members also considered several planning applications.

The next meeting of Cinderford Town Council will take place on 8 September 2026 and residents are welcome to attend.

NEW OUTDOOR GYM EQUIPMENT INSTALLED AT MINERS WELFARE PLAYING FIELD



Residents can now enjoy two new additions to the outdoor gym area at Miners Welfare Playing Field, located near Barleycorn Square. The installation includes a set of parallel bars and a square pull-up station, providing even more opportunities for free outdoor exercise.

The new equipment has been funded through the County Councillor Grassroots Neighbourhood Fund, administered by Gloucestershire County Council, and forms part of the Town Council's ongoing commitment to improving community facilities and encouraging healthy, active, lifestyles.

Suitable for a range of ages and fitness levels, the equipment offers residents the chance to improve their strength, fitness and overall wellbeing; while making greater use of the town's green spaces.

We hope the community enjoys these new facilities and takes full advantage of this latest enhancement to the outdoor gym area.



FUN AND FREE ACTIVITIES AND REWARDS DURING THE LIBRARY CHALLENGE 2026

Looking for free and low-cost things to do with your children this summer? Beginning on Saturday 11th July, libraries in the Forest of Dean and across the county have launched the library challenge 2026.

This year's theme is Tales Through Time, celebrating our county's rich and varied heritage through events, tasks, and prizes.



Children ages 3 and up can sign up for free to receive a journal and discovery map, and work their way through the nine tasks towards rewards including stickers, certificates, a sustainable wooden medal, and chances to win book bundles and vouchers. Children can complete the challenge their way: through hands-on activities, family discussions, nature walks, drawing, listening to music—and of course borrowing any books they choose (including comics, e-books, and audiobooks).

It is free to take part anytime during the summer with a free library membership. If you are not yet a member of the library it is free to sign up, just visit gloslibraries.uk or drop in to your local library.

This year, the county has been divided into six different discovery zones: Forest of Dean's zone is entitled 'Courageous Quests' and each library is presenting a special aspect of that zone. Cinderford Library has chosen 'Brave Knights' to celebrate the age of chivalry, and is offering several crafts and activities throughout the summer for free or pay-what-you-can. Construct a tube knight, create your own knight's helmet or maiden's crown and veil, or have a picnic at the Round Table! Many events must be booked in advance, so head over to gloslibraries.uk/events to see what's on at Cinderford Library. Have children who aren't interested in knights or quests? They can still participate and complete the challenge on whatever topic excites them!

Last year, over 6,500 children signed up to The Library Challenge across Gloucestershire. This year we hope to increase the number of joiners to get children excited about using the library and 'go all in' for the National Year of Reading.

CINDERFORD TOWN YOUTH - SUMMER PLANS & OPEN TRAINING

Cinderford Town Youth Football Club enters the 2026/27 season stronger than ever, now proudly supporting over 30 teams across the club. This number doesn't even include the hugely popular Sunday morning football, where many of the youngest players — aged just 4 and 5 — begin their football journey.

The teams span under-7s through to under-18s, with thriving boys' and girls' sections. throughout late June and early July. The club have been running open training sessions for both new and returning players ahead of the new season. With temperatures climbing above 30°C and England involved in key fixtures, a small number of sessions were postponed, but all remaining open training has now been completed.

CTYFC are excited for the season ahead and look forward to restarting their under-5 sessions in September, welcoming the next generation of young footballers. They are also delighted that girls' teams will be playing at the new Steam Mills pitch next season — a fantastic step forward that ensures the rapidly growing girls' section has a dedicated place to play and develop.

DELIVERING FOR CINDERFORD: COMPLETION OF OUR LOCAL REGENERATION FUND PROJECT.

The completion of our Local Regeneration Fund project for The Wesley, No.6 Market Street (former HSBC) and Rheola House, marks a significant milestone for Cinderford.

What began as an extremely ambitious and somewhat daunting vision to improve key community assets has now become a reality, delivering modern, sustainable and fit-for-purpose facilities that will benefit residents, organisations and businesses for the coming years. Perhaps the greatest achievement is that the project has been delivered on time and within budget! While the finished buildings and the addition of two Changing Places facilities, speak for themselves, the journey to completion has not been without its challenges ...and yes, there were many sleepless nights! From the beginning, the aim was clear: to invest in important community buildings, improve accessibility, reduce long-term running costs, and create energy efficient and sustainable spaces that serve the people of Cinderford, The Forest and beyond. Through significant investment and careful planning, each site has been transformed while retaining its unique identity within the town.

The Wesley, Forest of Dean Community and Arts Centre

The Wesley a Grade II listed church, has undergone extensive improvements, ensuring it remains a welcoming community hub. The project focused on renovating and modernising the building while protecting its character and heritage.

Accessibility improvements, an equipped Theatre Hall and performance space, upgraded facilities and energy-efficient heating measures, have created a comfortable and sustainable environment for a wide range of groups, events and activities.

Today, The Wesley is better equipped than ever to support the community. Whether for local organisations, artists, educational activities, worship, performances, meetings or celebrations, the use and users are varied, and all are welcome.

No.6 Market Street

No.6 Market Street has been transformed into a modern, high-tech, sustainable, flexible space that contributes to the ongoing regeneration of the town centre.

The funding has helped breathe new life into an important town centre property. This well-known characterful building is where specialists work with young people in challenging circumstances, help them reach their full potential in learning and in life, using the power and benefits that music brings.

Rheola House

At Rheola House, substantial works have improved the building's energy efficiency and functionality. The investment has ensured that the building continues to serve the community while reducing future maintenance demands and operational costs.

The completed works provide a modern sustainable facility that supports local businesses, provides a space for co-working and enhances the overall quality of the working environment.



Overcoming Challenges

While the meeting of the completion date and budget tell one story, they do not reflect the problem-solving and determination that took place behind the scenes. Like many construction and refurbishment projects, unforeseen challenges emerged. Hidden building issues, evolving technical requirements, supply chain pressures and the complexities of working within existing structures all required careful management and decision-making.

There were moments when plans needed to be adapted, schedules reviewed and solutions sought, to overcome unexpected obstacles. Completion of the project was only possible because of the collaborative, positive, approach taken by local contractors, advice of professionals, Councillors and our Town Clerk, all working towards the same goal. Every challenge was met with a commitment and a determination to find practical solutions without compromising quality, business relationships, timescales or finances. Special thanks must go to Les Love, Estates Manager, for project managing the renovation project and for her vision, dedication and commitment. The Town Council also wish to thank FODDC staff for their project support during the works.

A Collective Achievement

The completion of this project is a testament to what can be achieved when a community shares a vision and works together to both deliver and achieve. These improvements are about much more than bricks and mortar. They represent investment in people, community organisations and local businesses. The upgraded buildings provide opportunities for community engagement, economic growth, cultural activities and improved public services for many years to come. Despite the inevitable trials and tribulations along the way (many and varied!), investment by the Local Regeneration Fund has achieved its objectives; to create lasting improvements for the benefit of current and future use of buildings in our town by the community and all who use them. Understandably, there will always be sceptics and there will always be those who question the value of change ... but, completion of The Wesley, No.6 Market Street and Rheola House stands as an example of successful regeneration, delivered on time, on budget, and with the Cinderford community at its heart.

CINDERFORD TOWN COUNCIL INVESTING IN SUSTAINABLE HEATING SOLUTIONS

With support from the Town and Parish Council Climate Adaptation Grant, Cinderford Town Council has installed modern infrared heating panels in the Council Chamber and Royston Room of The Council Office. These improvements are helping to create more energy-efficient, comfortable and sustainable community spaces for residents and local groups.



Infrared heating technology offers a range of benefits, including high energy efficiency, simple installation, reduced maintenance requirements and improved, controlled, comfort levels for building users. The system is also fully compatible with renewable electricity generation, supporting the transition to lower-carbon energy use within the building.

A key feature of the project is the integration of the heating system with the building's existing solar photovoltaic (PV) generation. By making use of renewable electricity produced on site, the Town Council has reduced its reliance on fossil fuels, lowered running costs and reduced greenhouse gas emissions. This helps strengthen the resilience of the building while supporting both local and national climate goals.

The project is already delivering wider community benefits. Local groups using the facilities can enjoy improved comfort and accessibility, while the investment demonstrates how public buildings can adapt to climate challenges through practical, long-term solutions. Lower energy costs, more efficient heating that warms people rather than space, and reduced dependence on fossil fuels are providing ongoing financial and environmental benefits for both the Council and the Cinderford community we proudly serve.

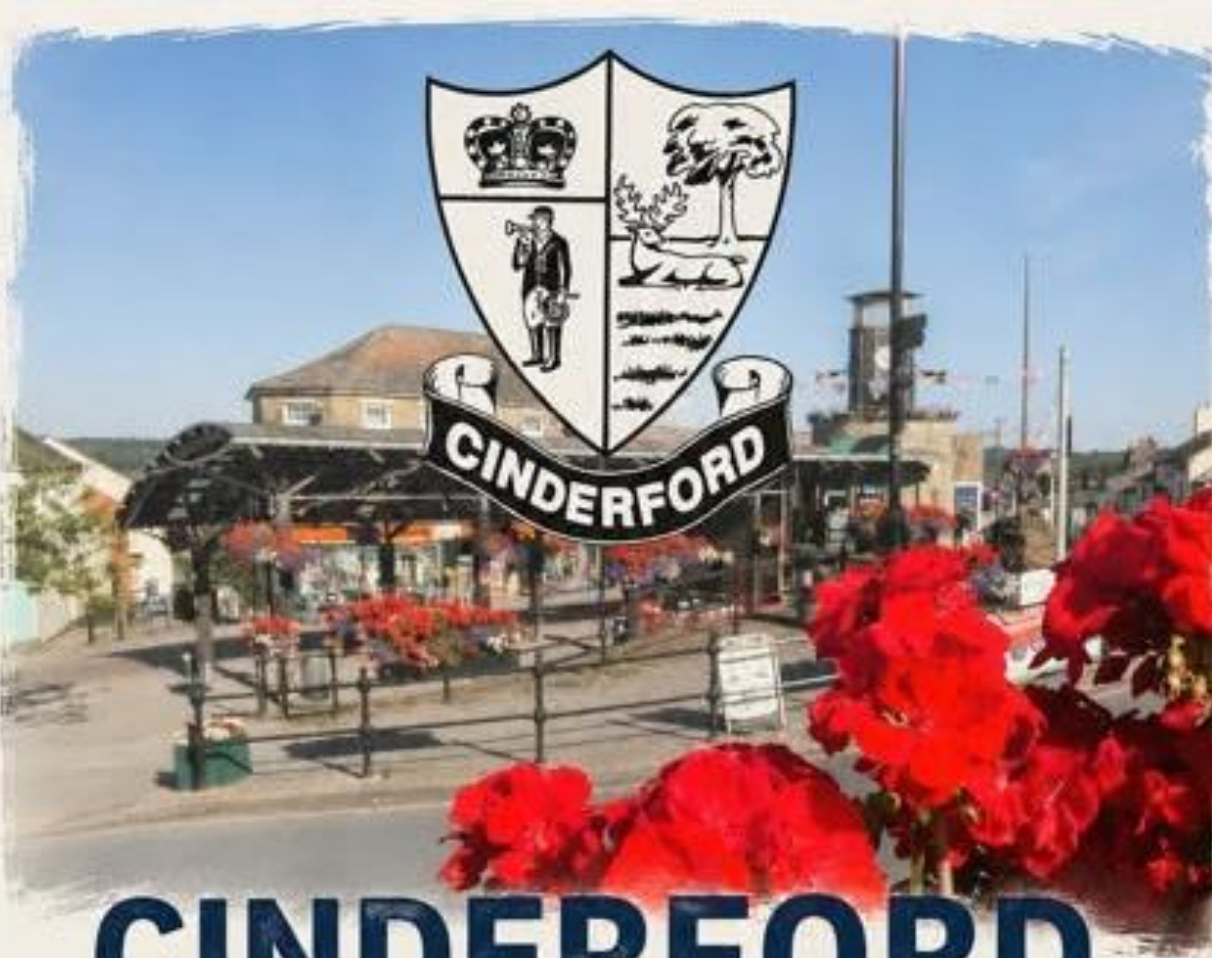
